## **Reflection for the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (Year A)** **Christ is the King of Our Hearts**

Today, we celebrate the universal kingship of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. This celebration marks the last Sunday in the Church’s liturgical year. The close of the liturgical year is a reminder that Christ will come again and so we should keep on building a just and peaceful society until he comes.

**Christ is the Promised King of the Universe:** In the Old Testament, the promised Messiah is already portrayed as a king. According to the prophecy of Isaiah (9:6-7), the promised Messiah would reign on David’s throne and he would establish justice and righteousness on earth forever. Because of David’s sincerity in serving Yahweh, God made a covenant with him that his kingdom would last forever (Ps 89:2-3). However, we know that the ancient kingdom of David has ended but as God does not deceive, he has continued this kingdom in the salvific mission of Christ who is the eternal Son of David (Mk 10:48; Mt 21:9). Thus, God has fulfilled the promise of everlasting Davidic kingdom in Jesus whom we worship as the King of the universe. Hence, Matthew traces the lineage of Jesus back to David (Mt 1:1). While the kingship of Jesus is traced back to King David his ancestral father, he is greater than David because he existed even before Abraham who was the ancestor of David (Jn 8:58).

**Christ is the Shepherd-King:** As our King, Jesus looks after us and guards us a shepherd guards his flock (Jer 31:10). Christ is the shepherd who cares for his weak and wounded sheep. As his sheep, we have faced dangers in life, but he never deserts us during these difficult times. When our hearts are wounded with grief and despair, he dresses them with the soothing oils of his grace and the hope of salvation.

**Christ is the Judge Who Saves:** The First Reading ends with the shepherd’s promise to judge his sheep. This leads us to the Gospel Reading (Matthew 25:31-46) which seemingly describes the manner of the last judgment. We see in this description the marks of those who belong to Christ in their manners of life. It teaches us Christians how we are to live out our lives as we await the coming of the Lord. The Christian life

is one which is characterised by good works. Doing good works simply means responding to the concrete needs of the poor. In the light of this, St John encourages us that our love for our brothers and sisters should not end in mere words but should be lived out in active and genuine care for them (1 Jn 3:18). This includes feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, caring for the sick, homeless, forgotten and marginalised. With such actions, Christ saves the world through us. Through these works of mercy, those who feel unloved come to know that our Father in heaven loves them also.

**Building the Kingdom of Peace and Justice:** When asked by Pilate if he was the king of the Jews and about the nature of his kingship, Jesus stated that his kingdom is not of this world (Jn 18:33-37). With this, he meant that the origin of his kingship is not of this world but of heaven. It is the kingdom of justice, peace and love which unites all who are members of the kingdom. We join in building this kingdom of justice and peace through the works of love we render to others. The loving and peaceful society we build here on earth then becomes an anticipation of the everlasting joy we hope to enjoy in heaven.

**Christ Reigns in Our Hearts:** As the king of the universe, Christ reigns over all and he holds all things in being (Col 1:17). As our Lord and Saviour, Christ also reigns in our hearts and he wants us to let him come into the difficult corners of our lives. It is in these ‘secret places’ of our hearts that we tend to lock up our pains and sorrows. When we let him in whenever he knocks, (Rev 3:20), he comes to comfort us, and he restores our hope in him. May Christ the king of the universe reign in our hearts that we may show his loving face to the world. Amen.
