Reflection for the Baptism of the Lord (Year B)

God Still Speaks to Us in His Son

After he was found in the Temple by his parents, Christ went home with them and he lived under their authority (Lk 1:51). Following this, not much is said about his childhood. The event of Christ's baptism then introduces us into his public life and ministry.

Jesus is the Son of God: At Jesus' baptism, a voice was heard from heaven which said, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you' (Mk 1:11). The Scriptures teach that heaven is God's throne and earth is his footstool (Is 66:1). The voice that spoke could only be that of God the Father. Thus, God publicly announced Christ's divine Sonship to the world which he came to save. Also, before the baptism of Jesus, all the prophets of old were speaking in metaphors about the divine Sonship of Jesus. His baptism then became the first time when his divine Sonship would be clearly affirmed by God himself (1 In 5:9). Also, at the baptism of Jesus, the three persons of the Holy Trinity were present. God the Father spoke from heaven at the baptism of God the Son on whom God the Holy Spirit descended in the form of a dove. Thus, the saving mission of Christ which was inaugurated at his baptism is the joint mission of the Holy Trinity (CCC 689).

Christ is One with Us: The baptism of John the Baptist was for the remission of sins (Mt 3:5). However, when Christ received baptism from the hands of John, it was not to be cleansed of any sin of his. Rather, he accepted baptism in order to identify with our humanity which has been weakened by sin. The presence of sin and evil in the world has thus weakened our will to obey God. Yet, the public mission of Christ which started at his baptism and culminated at his resurrection has strengthened our will to obey God. By his baptism, Christ identifies himself with the sin of the people. Thus, John speaks of him as the Lamb who takes away the sin of the world (Jn 1:29). At his baptism, Christ identifies with us in our desire to do God's will. He knows that this desire meets with obstacles which, at times, are beyond our control.

Jesus Inaugurates Christian Baptism: When Jesus entered the River Jordan at his baptism, he sanctified the waters that would be used to baptise those who believe in him. He also commissioned his disciples to baptise believers into the Trinity (Mt 28:19). Our baptism then becomes the means through which we begin to share in the blessed life of the Holy Trinity. As we celebrate the baptism of Jesus today, we also recall the days of our baptism, the days on which we became children of God who have been claimed for his glory.

Symbolically, this sacrament was prefigured in the

Old Testament when God made the Israelites to pass

through the Red Sea unharmed (Ex 14). Similarly, Jesus also entered the waters of the River Jordan and came out victorious. We who have been baptised are also assured of crossing over death into new life in Christ. **God Still Speaks to Us:** It is also profoundly significant that at the baptism of Jesus, the heavens opened, and the voice of God was heard speaking to humans. Centuries before the birth of Jesus, prophecy had ended in Israel and the Jews supposed that God had stopped speaking to his people. At the baptism of Jesus, the heavens were opened once again to reassure us that God still speaks to his people. However, he no longer speaks through prophets. He now speaks to us directly through his Son (Heb 1:1-2). There are occasions when we also, like the Jews, suppose that God no longer hears our prayer. We feel as if he has abandoned us to our struggles and we now carry our burdens alone. At his baptism, Christ went down into the river and came right up. This symbolises his death and resurrection. It also reminds us of our own resurrection from the dead on the last day when Christ will hold us by the hand and take us into the wonderful light of the resurrection. May the waters of baptism which claimed us for God grant us the peace and favour of God. Amen.
